# A Safety Reminder for the Holiday Season

The month of December brings with it the joy of celebrating the winter holidays with family and loved ones. It comes at the end of a long year and typically provides gatherings where we can see people that we haven't seen in a while, share gifts, eat wonderful holiday foods and sweets, and yes, most likely be in a home setting or local establishment where alcohol is served. The American Society of Safety Professionals (ASSP) lists "communicating hazards and risks to prevent injury" and "helping develop and sustain workplace cultures that are driven by values — not regulatory consequences" as roles for a safety officer in the workplace; however, after just reading that the New Mexico Department of Public Safety (State Police) will be conducting sobriety checkpoints, saturation patrols, and registration, insurance, and driver's license checkpoints in all New Mexico counties during the month of December, I am reminded that true safety professionals have at their core a desire and drive to look out for others even outside of work. Or, one might argue during the holidays especially outside of work. That is why I want to remind everyone to look out for ourselves AND others this holiday season. Besides utilizing a nondrinking designated driver (those who do the driving are Godsends!), there are a number of local organizations that will provide, free of charge, a

ride home for those who have imbibed and should not drive:

The New Mexico Department of Transportation (NMDOT) is partnering with Bernalillo County, the city of Albuquerque, Cumulus radio stations, and Uber to support the "Take a Ride on Us" program, designed to combat drunk driving. The program offers 2,000 participants an Uber credit of up to \$15, two rides per person, beginning noon Monday, Dec. 20 through 3 a.m. Monday, Dec. 27. Since its inception in the summer of 2017, the program has successfully provided over 52,000 safe rides to residents in the Albuquerque Metro area.

Glasheen, Valles & Inderman Injury Lawyers "Take a Ride on Us" program provides Uber discount codes for safe transportation (\$10 off per ride / two rides per person) December 22-26, 2024 and December 29, 2024 – January 2, 2025.

Ride sharing services always allow you to quickly get a ride from your phone. Services are available in Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Las Cruces, Roswell, Gallup and Taos (Uber & Lvft).

Plan ahead and arrange a ride to/from your holiday destination with a family member, friend, or roommate who will not be drinking.

Putting statistics to this topic, as safety professionals are inclined to do, alcohol is involved in 40% of all fatal traffic crashes in New Mexico.

New Mexico ranks third in

the nation as the worst states for drunk driving fatality rates (approximately 33% of all traffic fatalities in the state were due to drunk drivers).

• In 2022, Bernalillo County ranked first in the state with 636 alcohol-related crashes and first in alcohol-involved fatal crashes (40), and Albuquerque was the state's topranked city for alcoholinvolved crashes between 2018 and 2022.

And law enforcement continues to step up their efforts to combat these numbers, with 8,329 DWI arrests statewide in 2022. Incidentally, the New Mexico Department of Public Safety has some really informative and useful information on their website.

Lastly, if you see somebody on the road over the holidays who appears to be driving under the influence, and may present a danger to themselves or to others on the road, endwi's Drunk Busters Program allows good drivers to quickly and effectively report suspected DWI drivers through the use of a toll-free number and cell phone convenience key.

In closing, your New Mexico ASSP Chapter wishes you and yours a joyous and safe holiday season, and asks that you help our fellow New Mexicans to be as safe as possible while celebrating and driving.
